## Sunshine State Conference

### SSC History-An Overview

Founded in 1975, the Sunshine State Conference has risen from a single sport organization to the Division II "Conference of National Champions." Since its inception, the conference has grown steadily in sports played, membership and national prominence.

Sunshine State Conference schools have won NCAA national championships (57 total) in baseball, softball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, men's basketball, men's and women's tennis and volleyball, and are nationally recognized in men's and women's cross country as well as women's rowing.

The Sunshine State conference sponsors championships in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis, women's volleyball, softball and women's crew.

The first NCAA Division II national championship won by an SSC school was in the spring of 1978.

The Florida Southern College baseball team captured the national crown that year.

### SSC Chronological History

**March 2, 1975** - Basketball conference exploration meeting is held at Florida Southern College in Lakeland. Main purpose of meeting is to discuss formation of an NCAA Division II mid-Florida basketball conference.

**March 16, 1975** - Second exploration meeting is held at Eckerd College in St. Petersburg. The name "Sunshine State Conference" is suggested by Dr. Calvin C. Miller and is adopted for league use. Norm Kaye of Saint Leo is named Interim Commissioner. Dr. Thomas B. Southard, president of Saint Leo College, is named as first conference president. SSC Charter schools include:

- Biscayne College (now Saint Thomas University)
- Eckerd College
- Florida Southern College
- Florida Technological University (now the

University of Central Florida)

- Rollins College
- Saint Leo College

**June 1975** - Conference constitution adopted.

**October 8, 1975** - First meeting of the SSC is held in Orlando. Basketball regulations and League By-Laws are revised and approved.

**December 3, 1975** - Florida Southern defeats Eckerd, 96-84, in first SSC basketball game played in Saint Petersburg.

**April 8, 1976** - Dick Pace is named league commissioner. NCAA approves automatic bid for SSC basketball champion. Golf and Tennis are added to league for 1976-77 schedules.

**May 18, 1977** - League adopts post-season tournament to decide basketball champion for NCAA tournament. Baseball and Soccer are added to 1977-78 schedules.

**September 30, 1979** - Cross Country is added to league schedules. Ken Stibler of Biscayne College is named as SSC Executive Secretary.

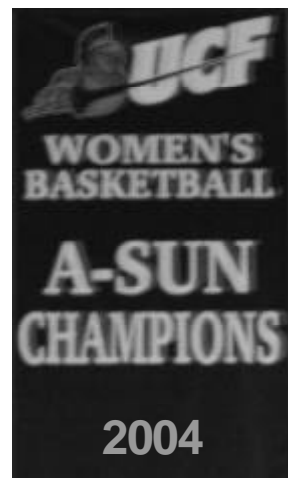
**February 1, 1981** - Norm Kaye of Saint Leo is appointed as executive director of the SSC. Executive Committee is formed, consisting of league athletic directors.

**July 1, 1981** - Florida Institute of Technology joins the Sunshine State Conference.

**September 2, 1981** - University of Tampa joins the Sunshine State Conference.

**April 15, 1982** - League adopts women's competition in basketball, cross country, slow-pitch softball, tennis, and volleyball.

**May 1, 1984** - University of Central Florida (formerly Florida Technological University) withdraws from the conference. Women's fast-pitch softball is adopted for league play in 1985.



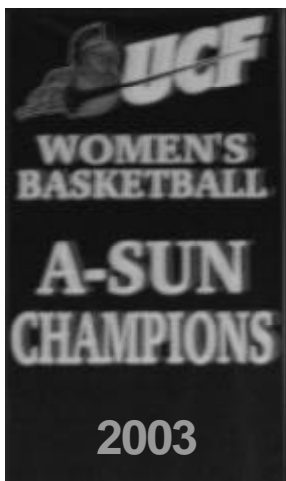

## Atlantic Sun



### History

The Atlantic Sun Conference celebrates 25 years of academic and athletic success in 2003. Founded September 19, 1978, the conference has operated through a quarter century in the ever-changing landscape of intercollegiate athletics with a consistent commitment to its Constitutional Mission to "assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports." Formerly known as the Trans America Athletic Conference, the Atlantic Sun changed its name in June of 2001.

Bill Bibb became the A-Sun's third full-time commissioner when he took the reigns in October of 1991. Bibb followed Lou McCullough (1983-91) and Bob Vanatta (1979-83). The A-Sun office has been in Macon, Georgia, since April, 1992, after relocating from Athens, Georgia (1983-1992). The first office was located in Shreveport, Louisiana (1979-1983).

### Academic Excellence

The A-Sun continues to build on a rich history of superior academic achievement. The bar continues to rise as Belmont University broke its own single-season conference mark with 69% of its athletes earning All-Academic honors (140 of 203). For the second straight season the A-Sun set a new record as 1,274 student-athletes earned All-Academic honors. Forty-seven percent of all A-Sun athletes earned all-academic honors. The Mercer women's tennis team completed the year as the only A-Sun team with every member earning all-academic honors (7 of 7). An impressive eight A-Sun athletes earned Academic All-American status, including two first-team honorees (Belmont's Adam Mark, Men's Basketball and UCF's Ryan Bear, Baseball).

### Athletic Excellence

The A-Sun has continually matched its classroom achievement with success on the playing fields. Over the past six years the A-Sun has posted NCAA wins in each of the team sports that it sponsors. The A-Sun advanced three teams in the 2003 NCAA Baseball Championship for the fourth straight year, making the ASun the only I-AAA conference in the nation to accomplish that feat. Stetson's Brian Snyder was drafted 26th overall by the Oakland A's, making him the highest of the 20 A-Sun athletes chosen in the 2003 Major League Baseball Draft. The A-Sun also sent multiple teams to the



NCAA in men's golf (GSU, JSU) for the first time. In men's basketball, four A-Sun teams finished the season with 20 or more wins for the first time (UCF, JSU, Mercer, TSU), as the A-Sun finished the season with its highest RPI in league history. In softball, A-Sun power FAU advanced to the third day of the NCAA Regional for the first time since 1999 after advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the fifth straight season and winning its seventh straight A-Sun Championship.

### Membership

The A-Sun is a blend of the southeast's finest private and most dynamic state schools. With outstanding achievement in academics and athletics, the Atlantic Sun ranks as one of the country's top all-around collegiate athletic conferences. In addition to the great schools, the A-Sun boasts some of the nation's top destination areas and media markets. With Atlanta and Orlando, Nashville and Jacksonville, Boca Raton, Daytona Beach and Raleigh/Durham, the Atlantic Sun offers the best of the southeastern United States.
